ello and welcome to the Autumn edition of the Town Council Newsletter.

It was with deep sadness, whilst preparing these notes I learnt of the passing of HM Queen Elizabeth II and what was the end of a glorious era. As the longest reigning monarch her loss will have not only been felt across our nation and across the world but also very much here in our own community. For many, the Queen had always been there and meant so much to so many. Her commitment to duty and service to the people was an inspiration to us all. I know you have all shown your respects in different ways.

On behalf of the Town Council and residents I sent a letter of condolence to King Charles III and the Royal Family offering our sincere condolences.

Following the death of Her Majesty, the Town Council followed the protocol required and that of the Proclamation of the Accession of King Charles III. I attended the County Proclamation at the Town Hall, Ipswich and brought back the scroll for the Town Proclamation Ceremony, which I read in the Old Post Square, Leiston to a well attended audience.

I also attended the County Service of Commemoration and Thanks Giving for



the life or our late Sovereign Lady, Queen Elizabeth II at St Edmundsbury Cathedral, Bury St Edmunds and a Service of Prayer and Reflection at St Margarets Church, Leiston



On the eve of the funeral of Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, I led a Moment of Reflection in the Old Post Office Square for residents and Councillors.

Well I don't think we could have asked for better Summer weather than we have experienced this year, although I appreciate it may have been too hot for some on several occasions, but hope you

have enjoyed the summer break.

Of course, many such as gardeners and farmers will have struggled, whilst I recognise the challenges and workload caused by the extreme heat and spate weather conditions that our emergency services will have endured.

I have written to the Chief Fire Officer of Suffolk, on behalf of the Town Council thanking firefighters and support staff for the tremendous effort, they made during the Summer in keeping our residents safe and protecting property.

I was pleased to go along and present the Allotment Association "Best Kept Allotment" award for this year and congratulate Irene Lucas on winning the award not for the first time. Irene's plot is a well kept plot and reflects all her hard work.



The VJ commemoration took place in August at the Long Shop Museum, I attended and laid a wreath on behalf of the Town Council. I thank the Leiston Branch of the Royal British Legion and Friends of the Suffolk Regiment for again organising this important ceremony and keeping it going.

At the end of September, Caroline Rinder the Town Clerk moved on to pastures new and we wish Caroline all the best for the future. I thank Caroline for all her hard work at the Town Council office, first as Deputy Clerk and for the last couple of years as Town Clerk. I am sure you will

Autumn Covid Booster Eligibility

People aged 50 years and over, those in care homes, carers, frontline health and social care staff, those aged 5 years and over in clinical risk groups and close contacts of immunocompromised individuals are being offered an autumn booster of COVID-19 vaccine.

Flu Eligibility

People aged 50 years and over, those in care homes, those aged 50 years and under in clinical risk groups, carers, frontline health and social care staff and close contacts of immunocompromised individuals are being offered a Flu vaccination.



Volunteer trustees are urgently needed for help to set up a charity for Leiston Community Defibrillator. Leiston Community

Defibrillator is the name given to the 24 hr Community Public Accessible Defibrillator (CPAD) located at Leiston Family Hub in Waterloo Avenue. It was installed at the family hub with the permission of Suffolk County Council who own the building, and is currently the sole responsibility of the project organiser. Since it's installation in July 2017 it has gone out twelve times and has been used once. Trustees will be responsible for the following:

Raising funds to keep the defibrillator supplied with batteries, electrode pads and starter kits. After the current 10 year worry free replacement package expires in June 2027, items will have to be purchased as required. Batteries are replaced when low, electrode pads are replaced when they reach their expiry date or have been used, and starter kits are replaced when they have been used. Some additional funds will be required for other maintenance costs and administration.

Appointing the Primary Guardian and Supporting Guardians. The Primary

Guardian is responsible for ensuring that the defibrillator status details are kept up to date on The Circuit - The National Defibrillator Network, ordering replacements items, and carrying out regular site checks and maintenance. When the defibrillator has been returned. the Primary Guardian or a Supporting Guardian will check it and replace used items, before returning it to emergency ready status on The Circuit. Supporting Guardians can assist the Primary Guardian by carrying out additional site checks when passing. Trustees will be able to take on these guardian roles.

A minimum of three trustees are required to set up a charity, but it would be prudent to start with a few more. If you would like to help, please contact the Primary Guardian by calling 01728 833903 or by mailing linda.hawes1@btinternet.com

Park Carefully, Save Lives



Motorists are urged to take care when parking their vehicles, so they do not prevent our fire engines, and other emergency vehicles from attending potentially

life-threatening emergencies.

There are some areas around the town that are notorious for motorists parking down both sides of a narrow street and there have been times when fire engines haven't been able to get past at all. This of course can cause us a significant delay in responding to emergencies where someone's life could be at risk and our attendance time is crucial

This is a growing problem due in part to • increasing car ownership, reduced or unused resident parking areas, and thoughtless parking by some motorists. The problem can be compounded at night and during the

school pick-up and drop-off times.

The average fire engine is 2.6 metres (8.5 feet) wide and 8 metres (26 feet) long when you park your vehicle in a narrow street, always check you have left enough room for a fire engine to get past.

When parking please:

- Park close to the kerb
- Park straight with wheels straight
- Fold in wing mirrors
- In narrow streets only park on one side of the road (where possible)
- Obey the Highway Code and road markings such as yellow lines and box iunctions
- Do not park too close to corners or traffic calming measures
- Leave extra room at tight junctions
- Remember every second counts when someone needs our help



Enforcement of parking offences passed from Suffolk Constabulary to local authorities on 6th April 2020. Civil Parking Enforcement Officers are

now employed by each local authority with powers to issue fixed penalty notices where parking offences are being committed. These powers were those previously held by Police. This means Suffolk Constabulary no longer has powers to deal with parking offences other than those shown below:

Police retain powers to enforce:

- Dangerous or obstructive parking:
- Vehicles parked pedestrian

crossings and zig zag lines;

Moving vehicle violations, such as speeding and going through 'no entry'

Most parking violations, however, have become civil offences dealt with by the local authority.

As winter approaches, with the current cost of living crisis, households are understandably concerned about how much their energy bills could cost. Many will have already seen the energy efficiency scheme being promoted in Leiston by Net Zero Leiston. IHI ltd. are our chosen delivery partner for this scheme and have been working hard to sign up new households.

IHI have been able to capitalise on two forms of funding to install these insulation upgrades. One of these funding schemes is under a wider Warm Homes Suffolk scheme, which operates across the county. Eligibility for free insulation is based on household income (must be below £30k) and your home's EPC (energy performance certificate), which needs to be 'D' or below (D, E, F or G)

IHI have had a surge in interest with people checking their eligibility for the funding for new measures. If you wanted to discuss your eligibility, you can contact the IHI team to run through an initial eligibility check prior to a free home survey. If your home is deemed eligible, you could benefit from:

- Internal Wall Insulation
- Under Floor Insulation
- Roof Insulation

What a difference a year and one pound coin can make

Leiston Residents paid £1 membership fee to Leiston Community Land Trust, in support of their proposal to remove the 12ft high wall dividing the car park from the hidden derelict garden, open it up and provide community space to enhance the Town Centre, 12 months later the wall is





down and a new town square with music facilities replaces the unsightly rarely used hidden garden.

Over 300 Leiston Residents gave £1 to the Leiston Community Land Trust supporting and believing they would reform Leiston Town Centre, 12 months later the Community Land trust demonstrate they will deliver on their promise.

Phase one, the Church Square complete with bandstand is there for all to see, a proudly landscaped area by Chelsea Award winning Landscapers.

Open to all, the seating and tables being used daily for townsfolk lunch breaks.

The Bandstand providing music of all choices to the delight and entertainment of the public.

Further events providing a venue for local talent to share their music with the town.

What's Next - New Town Centre?

All appears quiet, but no, behind the scenes especially appointed officers of the Community Land Trust Partners East Suffolk Council are engaging specialist Architects to design the new town centre.

A master plan to meet the needs of the town, provide local affordable housing, new community spaces, new small retail units, a culture square. Look at possible

new larger library, Council Offices, the possibilities are endless, but such a major development needs time for planning & design.

Over the summer of this year our volunteers have carried out around 100 activities in response to phone calls. These include collecting prescriptions for people who cannot get to the pharmacy, giving help with filling in forms and taking food to people in an urgent situation. We also often get calls from people who are new to the area and are feeling lonely because they don't know anyone. We can tell them about what's on locally or help them register with CATS to use their transport. Worried relatives who live a long way away often call us for information about local groups and services and sometimes ask us to pop round and check that someone is OK.

We also continue to visit people and provide support with getting out to social activities. In July we took some guests to the garden party at the Red House in Aldeburgh where Britten Pears Arts provided the music and a lovely tea. We hope to go to the Christmas tea dance at Snape Maltings and perhaps fit in some other trips before the end of the year.

If you walk around the Valley Road allotments, you may have noticed that the Community Allotment has a new path. We

are gradually trying to make improvements so that it can be used by people who are not so mobile but who would like to visit the allotment and maybe just enjoy the air and watch the birds. We are grateful for the grant from the 'Connect for Health Community Chest' which paid for the path. This is funding to help local groups support people who are referred by the 'Community Connectors' who are linked with GP surgeries. These connectors help people improve their health and wellbeing by taking up new hobbies and joining social activities.



We would also like to say thank you to local people who have given us donations this year. Our volunteer time is free, but we do have to pay for various things such as insurance and the costs of trips, so we really appreciate any help.


